Wilkerson College Announces 2006 Schedule and Transformation

The Wilkerson College Board of Regents met Friday, January 27, 2007 at a called meeting. The purpose was to convene the newly expanded Board and continue the transformation and restructuring of the College. Joining Ill. Sir William B. Brunk, Ill. Sir H. Lloyd Wilkerson, Worshipful Lew Ledford, Most Worshipful Tom Gregory, PGM and Most Worshipful Bill Simpson, PGM on the Board are: Most Worshipful Bill Mathis, PGM, Most Worshipful Leonard Safrit, PGM, C. Ray Hall, PDDGM and Benton W. Oakes, Jr., PDDGM. Appointed as Officers of the College are Worshipful Billy Dill, Assistant Dean, Worshipful Ron Sortino, PM as Dean of Academics, Worshipful Larry Thompson, PM as Treasurer and Dean of Facilities and Logistics and Morty Jayson, PM as Secretary and Administrative Officer. The Officers will report to Dan Weatherington, Dean, who in turn reports to Dr. Brunk who was elected Chancellor of the College and President of the Board.

The intent behind the reorganization is to identify the various responsibilities of the College as well as the person or position to whom is accountable for actions.

Wilkerson College, North Carolina's College of Freemasonry, is sponsored jointly by The Scottish Rite Orient of North Carolina and the Grand Lodge of AF&AM of North Carolina. Its mission is a clear and simple one: to provide Freemasonry with the best trained Masonic leaders possible. Through classroom lectures, projects and homework assignments, the participants receive extensive training in effective lodge leadership and management, including Masonic history, fundraising techniques, mentoring, public speaking, Masonic education, meeting organization, finances, in-depth discussions on the Code as well as opening up and improving communications between the Master and the Lodge Secretary.

The 2006 schedule includes the first session, which is being held at the Masonic Home for Children in Oxford. The class will begin on Friday, March 3rd at Camp Oak Hill, located just outside of Oxford. On Saturday the class will meet at MHCO where they will begin their formal classes.

The second session will be held in Raleigh on Friday, March 31 and Saturday, April 1st. As in the past, Friday night activities will include dinner at the Grand Lodge, as well as a historical review of Freemasonry in North Carolina.

The third and final session for 2006 will take place at the Masonic and Eastern Star Home in Greensboro May 5th – 7th.

News from MESH

The Masonic and Eastern Star Home is affectionately known as MESH.

There has been a “paradigm” shift in our Masonic Home. At its inception in 1910, and since the first residents arrived in 1913, MESH has been dedicated to charity.

John A. Rose, PM of Stokesdale Lodge 428, our Administrator, says that, *“Poverty and the Health are the great equalizers. The shift at MESH has been in defining the term, ‘need’.* “

“Need” has evolved from simply the need for money to other issues. In fact, the definition includes the absence of resources to satisfactorily

address other issues such as dignity, pride and independence, loss of physical and/or mental health, exhaustion of financial resources, suitable or affordable housing near needed services, physical, emotional or financial security and lack of family support.

In evaluating need, consideration is given to issues such as availability or willingness of supportive family members, ability to care for oneself, financial resources, emotional needs, and, beyond money, whether one needs the care, social environment, and assistance of the Home.

Residents have always "*paid their way*". Some, however, live longer than their assets can fully support. Today, rather than having to "assign" assets and income to MESH, a resident may pay their way as long as they can. At the point they can no longer afford to do so, MESH will step up to the plate with subsidy to the extent the Home has been supported.

Economy of scale allows those able to pay their way to actually help MESH with its charitable relief

burden. This business plan has allowed the construction of a \$6.5 million Care Center and a \$7.0 million Independent Living Village without additional burden to our members.

MESH continues to need help from its members. In the long run, the extent of our charity is determined by our members. Given the current economic constraints, MESH is temporarily unable to admit those who require subsidized services.

In fiscal year 2005, North Carolina Masons supported MESH with \$401,772. A charity shortfall, combined with the effects of war and economy, has resulted in a cost of \$850,284 for relief of residents who are sponsored by Masonic Lodges. This is a variance of \$448,512 or \$10 per member.

The average gift per Mason is \$8.92. Semper Fidelis Lodge [My Home Lodge] contributed \$5,305 for a per member average of just under \$25.00. Our Lodge contributed 59% of the \$9,019 for District 4, of which we are a part.

News from the Masonic Home for Children at Oxford

MHCO receives another accreditation

Further illustrating the high quality of care given by The Masonic Home for Children at Oxford to its residents, on January 19, 2006 the Home learned that it had received EAGLE accreditation. For the second time in five months The Masonic Home for Children at Oxford was recognized for its excellence of operation and its adherence to standards of continuous quality improvement, best practices, and the strength of its mission to assist children and their

families. **Educational Assessment Guidelines Leading toward Excellence**, or as it is more commonly known, EAGLE is an accreditation program of the United Methodist Association of Health and Welfare Ministries that is being shared with other religious, faith-based and social welfare organizations and is recognized as the only spiritually centered accrediting body that acknowledges organizations that exemplify excellence in their faith-based relationship and Christian mission. After a rigorous review of operations and the Home's policies and procedures and following a two-day site visit, EAGLE Vice President of Programs and Services Teresa Trost informed the Home that it would be receiving its official recognition nationally in March of 2006 in St. Louis, Missouri at the Associations National Convention. In 2005, The Home received accreditation from the Council on Accreditation, a nationally recognized accreditation organization which distinguishes children's homes and other organizations for their exemplary work in helping their children and their families. Calendar Campaign continues, goal not yet reached

The Masonic Home for Children's annual calendar campaign was mailed in late October, as it has been for the past several years. This year, as in years past, the campaign began quickly with over 1,000 responses in the first two weeks. The fundraiser, which sends a calendar to each member of the Masonic Fraternity in North Carolina, generates much needed money for the operation of the Home. As of January 1, 2006, the campaign was just over \$60,000 in total funds received, well short of the \$120,000 goal. The campaign continues throughout the year and annually receives donations averaging \$25 per calendar donor from over 1,800 members of the Masonic Fraternity.

Orphans Lodge receives Charter

On December 17, 2005, The Masonic Home for Children at Oxford played host to a very special and historical ceremony as the members of Orphans Lodge No. 761 received their charter as an official Masonic Lodge of The Grand Lodge of North Carolina. Over seventy Orphans Lodge Charter Members, fellow Masons, and family members packed the Cobb Center Museum and Archives Building for the ceremony. Just a few hundred yards from the Cobb Center, renovations have begun on Shipman Cottage which will be the permanent home of Orphans Lodge. The former residence home is slated for completion as a Lodge Temple in the fall of 2006 and will hold a Lodge room, a fellowship hall and kitchen, and a separate parking area and handicap entrance. In 2006 Orphans Lodge will conduct stated communications on April 8, June 24, October 14, and December 16. All Master Masons are invited to attend these meetings that will be held on the campus of The Masonic Home for Children and those brothers interested are encouraged to submit an application for affiliation to become a part of this very special Lodge dedicated to heightening the awareness and meeting the needs of the children at our Home in Oxford.
